### Transcript

But there's also lots of stuff that just doesn't get done because nobody gets to it.

They're too busy than they want to. So I'm just going back into startup world and remind them again of how important it is to just be able to push things forward by force of will, to say we're going to go take the hill, all right? We're going to go do this and people like yeah, you know, I'm busy, I got other stuff. No, we're going to do this like we have to make this happen and that ability to get people energized and to really make them go with you, all right? This is leadership versus management.
